

# Guidelines for International Student Scholarships of the National Chin-Yi University of Technology

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- I. This scholarship is provided to encourage international graduate and undergraduate students to learn Chinese, improve their Chinese language skills, and strengthen their career competitiveness after graduation.
- II. Recipients: The International Industrial Talent Education Special Program (INTENSE Program) or international graduate and undergraduate students formally registered at the University (excluding the International Bachelor Program, students from Macau and Hong Kong, overseas Chinese, mainland Chinese and exchange students) who have not received government scholarships since the second semester of the 2021 academic year to the second semester of the 2025 academic year. Two-year technical program, four-year technical program, and graduate students who have studied at the University for two semesters (inclusive) or other international students who have studied at the University as pre-graduate students for one semester (inclusive) are also eligible to apply (excluding graduates or students resuming their studies after suspending or extending their studies).
- III. Number of applications: One application every semester starting from the third semester. Other international pre-graduate students may apply once only, starting from the second semester.
- IV. Exam: The Language Center of the University will hold two Chinese tests every semester. International graduate and undergraduate students shall sit one test every semester and may not repeat a test. From the third semester, the test results of the previous two semesters will be used as a pre-test score (A) and the test results from the previous semester will be used as a post-test score (B). Other graduate students who are admitted as international pre-graduate students shall sit the Test of Chinese as a Foreign Language (TOCFL) when applying for a master's degree.
- V. Category: Scholarships are divided into full and half scholarships.
- VI. Scholarships are distributed in the order of the same nationality, semester (spring, fall), and school system (the same order for students from different countries).
- VII. Scholarship review standards and methods:
  - A. Full scholarship: A scholarship covering full tuition and miscellaneous semester fees.

1. Graduate students: May apply in the third and fourth semesters.
    - (1) Scholarship standards for the third semester: Study at least six credits in each of the previous two semesters and maintain an average test score of 75 or above in the previous semester. Students must also rank in the top 20% (inclusive) (rounded up to the nearest decimal), calculated as 30% of the Chinese pre-test score (A), 50% of the Chinese post-test score (B), and 20% of the Chinese progress score (B-A) from the previous two semesters. Students must also have a conduct score greater than 80 (inclusive) without a demerit (or two complaints). If more than one student has the same score, the student with the higher post-test score (B) shall be selected.
    - (2) Scholarship standards for the fourth semester: Study at least six credits in each of the previous three semesters (except for a thesis with confirmation from the advisor) and maintain an average test score of 75 or above in the previous semester. Students must also rank in the top 20% (inclusive) (rounded up to the nearest decimal), calculated by the sum of 30% of the Chinese pre-test score (A), 50% of the Chinese post-test score (B), and 20% of the Chinese progress score (B-A) from the previous two semesters. Students must also have a conduct score greater than 80 (inclusive) without a demerit (or two complaints). If more than one student has the same score, the student with the higher post-test score (B) shall be selected.
  2. Undergraduate students' applications starting from the third semester: Study at least nine credits in the previous semester and maintain an average test score of 65 or above in the previous semester. Students must also rank in the top 20% (inclusive) (rounded up to the nearest decimal), calculated by the sum of 30% of the Chinese pre-test score (A), 50% of the Chinese post-test score (B) and 20% of the Chinese progress score (B-A) from the previous two semesters. Students must also have a conduct score greater than 80 (inclusive) without a demerit (or two complaints). If more than one student has the same score, the student with the higher post-test score (B) shall be selected.
  3. Graduate students who are admitted as international pre-graduate students who pass the Test of Chinese as a Foreign Language (TOCFL) with a grade of B1 or above may submit an application from the second semester.
- B. Half scholarships: A scholarship covering half the tuition fees and miscellaneous semester fees.
1. Graduate students: May apply in the third and fourth semesters.
    - (1) Scholarship standards for the third semester: Study at least six credits in each of the previous two semesters and maintain an average test score of 75 or above in the previous semester. Students must also rank in the top 20% (inclusive) to 70% (rounded up to the nearest decimal), calculated by the sum of 30% of the Chinese pre-test score (A), 50% of the Chinese post-test score (B), and 20% of the Chinese progress score (B-A) from the previous two semesters. Students must also have a conduct score greater than 80 (inclusive) without a

demerit (or two complaints). If more than one student has the same score, the student with the higher post-test score (B) shall be selected.

- (2) Scholarship standards for the fourth semester: Study at least six credits in each of the previous three semesters in general (except for a thesis with confirmation from the advisor), maintain an average test score of 75 or above in the previous semester, and rank in the top 20% to 70% (inclusive) (rounded up to the nearest decimal), calculated by the sum of 30% of the Chinese pre-test score Chinese (A), 50% of the Chinese post-test score (B), and 20% Chinese progress score (B-A) in the previous two semesters. Students must also have a greater than 80 (inclusive) without a demerit (or two complaints). If more than one student has the same score, the student with the higher post-test score (B) shall be selected.

2. Undergraduate students' applications starting from the third semester: Study at least nine credits in the previous semester and maintain an average test score of 65 or above in the previous semester, and rank in the top 20% to 70% (inclusive) (rounded up to the nearest decimal), calculated by the sum of 30% of the Chinese pre-test score (A), 50% of the Chinese post-test score (B), and 20% of the Chinese progress score (B-A) in the previous two semesters. Students must also have a conduct score greater than 80 (inclusive) without a demerit (or two complaints). If more than one student has the same score, the student with the higher post-test score shall be selected.
3. Graduate students who are admitted as international pre-graduate students who pass the Test of Chinese as a Foreign Language (TOCFL) with a grade of A2 or above may submit an application from the second semester.

VIII. Application deadline: Announced by the Office of International Affairs.

IX. Documents to prepare:

- A. Application form
- B. Transcript
- C. Chinese test transcript from the Language Center or official transcript from the Test of Chinese as a Foreign Language
- D. Copy of student ID
- E. Copy of passbook cover for students in a financial institution
- F. Receipt of tuition and miscellaneous fee payment (certificate of at least half payment)
- G. Penalty and reward certificate

X. Application procedures: Graduate and undergraduate students shall submit the aforementioned documents to the Office of International Affairs before the announced deadline. The Office of International Affairs will submit the application to the International Student Scholarship Committee for review.

XI. Students who have received this scholarship may not collect a good performance scholarship, outstanding admission scholarship, and other internal and external tuition deduction scholarships.

- XII. Source of funds: Supported by subsidies from the MOE, donations and other funds raised, and study subsidies from the University.
- XIII. These guidelines shall be implemented upon approval of the Student Scholarship Management Committee and principal.
